## Course Description:

This course introduces theories, methods and concepts generally utilized in human services professions. The course examines various theories and methods in these professions, as well as their practical use. Major practice theories and evidence-based theoretical methodologies are explored. The course addresses its main objective: to expand essential theoretical and methodological skills and knowledge in human services professions.

## Learning Outcomes:

As a result of active participation in these sessions, a student can expect to:

- Understand, identify, and apply basic concepts of Social Services profession.
- Identify and describe main interventions in Social Services profession.
- Understand the role of a social service worker.
- Analyze various processes involved in applying Social Services methodologies.
- Critically reflect on basic values of social services profession
- Increase self-awareness in your practice as a social service worker.
- Explain reasons of applying various theories and methodologies in your practice as a social service worker.


## Course Format:

This 45 -Hour online course uses a variety of teaching/learning methods including discussion, personal reflection, experiential exercises, student presentations, role-plays, group activities and especially case studies. Our faculty aims to create an online synchronous and asynchronous learning environment where the learner is actively engaged in inquiry, critical thinking and problem solving. The online delivery provides you with a place where you can learn with and from others in a cooperative and collaborative manner.

You are expected to take a very active part in class discussions and take responsibility for your own learning. Be a positive and co-operative team member. Columbia College uses a facilitation model of instruction where the facilitator's role is to facilitate your learning. The expectation is that you will come to class prepared with pre-class homework completed. Your facilitator will engage you in activities that are based on your completed homework and readings. Your enthusiastic and positive approach in the classroom will create an atmosphere that will help every student develop the knowledge, skills and attitudes that are needed for success.

How you conduct yourself in our online classes will largely mirror your conduct in society and your future work site. For example, if you tend to ask questions, challenge the ideas of others in a respectful manner, draw out the best from your colleagues, and encourage both group development and task accomplishment in this class, it is likely you will do the same at work. A high level of student involvement and developing professionalism is expected in the classroom as you work towards your goal.

## Daily Tests

## Asynchronous Activities

Due Date: Classes 4, 6, \& 8
Weight: 15\%

Assignment \#1: Case Study Analysis
Due Date: Class 5
Weight: 20\%
Using the case study from Chapter 6, Susan, and Ted, answer the questions using a human services perspective/model.

- Use p. 151 and answer the questions in a professional manner.
- Reflect on a minimum three strategies to improve a few areas of concern for all involved.


## Writing Assignment Expectations:

- Objective: The objectives of the writing assignment is to critically apply concepts, ideas, and procedures to facilitate higher level learning. The assignments are designed so students can demonstrate depth of knowledge related to the course content.
- Focus: Each assignment is designed to apply knowledge from the chapters and class discussions.
- Format: All assignments will be double-spaced. Do not include title pages. A minimum of one-inch margins on each side. 12-point Calibri font is preferred. Each assignment should have a minimum length of 500 words but is not to exceed 750 words. Students will be evaluated according to Case Study Analysis rubric.


## How to avoid plagiarism?

The simplest way to avoid plagiarism is to reference any source properly (using both in-text, parenthetical citations in the body of your assignment and a "References" page at the end. While it is commonplace to build upon the knowledge of others, it is necessary to clearly state the sources and foundations of that knowledge. Referencing must conform to the APA referencing formats outlined in your ENGL110-1 texts (Maimon \& Yancey Tab 7).

## Assignment \#2 Article Review

Due: Classes 4 through 9
Weight 10\%
Review an article provided to you by the facilitator and present a synopsis of the article to the class. Articles will be provided by facilitator during the first class and posted on Moodle. The oral presentations about the article are expected to be 3-4 minutes long. Presentation days will be assigned on the first day of class, presentations will be classes 2-9.

The following questions should be considered in your presentation:

1. What was the article about? (summarize)
2. Why is this article important to social service workers?
3. What specific strategies does the article say about supporting clients?
4. What do you feel learned while reading the article?
5. Did anything surprise you about the article?
6. Anything else important that you would like to share with the class.

Assignment \#3 - Case Study: Assessment Interview Video (5 min)
Due Date: Class 10
Weight: 25\%
OFF CAMERA

1. Practice an assessment interview on a friend/family member with their permission about a common problem.
2. Develop a hypothetical service plan for a make-believe client.
3. Identify the formal human services resources in your community (hotlines, mental health clinics, and employment offices) by name and address.

USING Flipgrid App on Class 10 Channel, respond to your facilitator's prompt.
Questions and Suggestions for plan:

1. Identity the issue(s) for this client.
2. What type of information do you need from your client to help them?
3. Why is this an issue for this client?
4. What are the societal barriers for this client? (access to resources, education, discrimination, poverty, etc.)
5. How would a human services professional assess this problem?
6. Why is it important to assess problems accurately?
7. Name three things you learned about using resources in the community.

## Assignment Expectations:

- Objective: The objectives of the verbal/visual assignment is to critically apply concepts, ideas, and procedures to facilitate higher level learning. The assignment is designed so students can demonstrate depth of knowledge related to the course content.
- Focus: Each assignment is designed to apply knowledge from the chapters and class discussions.
- Format: Assignments are expected to be in Microsoft Teams format and shared with facilitator. You will be marked using the Peer Interview Rubric attached.


## Assignment \#4 Final Reflection on Project

Due: Class 10
Weight: 10\%
This final project will enable you to deeply reflect on your presentation experience, how it aided you in the development of professional communication skills and how it contributed to increased self-awareness of supports available to potential clients.

You may guide your reflection using the points below:

- Focus: Each assignment is designed to apply knowledge from the chapters and class discussions.
- Format: All assignments will be double-spaced. Do not include title pages. Include your name at the top of each page. A minimum of one-inch margins on each side. 12-point Calibri font is preferred. Each assignment should have a minimum length of 300 words but is not to exceed 500 words. Students will be evaluated according to the attached rubric: Reflective Writing Response Marking Rubric.
